## President's Message (Cont'd)

Tutors are often surprised by how much growth is achieved even in a short period of time. Please make sure you alert Sinda if you suspect that your student might be leaving the program so she can re-assess them before they leave.

Another way we can collect data is by completion of SMART student goals. SMART goals are: Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, Timely.

SMART goals are set up by the student in collaboration with the tutor. They are motivating because they are short term and achievable. We all love the feeling of completing a task! Here are some examples of SMART goals: I will finish reading this novel by March 1<sup>st</sup>, 2011; I will learn English so I can have a conference with my child's teacher in February of 2011; I will get at least 90% on my next 4 spelling tests; I will complete the Challenger 4 book by April 20th, 2011; I will read 300 sight words in 5 minutes or less by January 30<sup>th</sup>, 2011. I encourage you to set up a SMART goal with your student and please share it with Sinda. She will be happy to print out a special SMART GOAL CERTIFICATE OF COMPLETION for your student as soon as the goal has

been met. Thank you to tutor Jim Sass for suggesting this idea!

Finally, a plea for more tutors! Training for new tutors begins on January 15<sup>th</sup>, 2011. Please ask friends, family and neighbors to become involved in our important work!
